

Though we are saddened by the sudden loss of our spiritual Brother, we are content in knowing he has arrived at his reward in Heaven. Howard left an inspiring legacy of faith and service, providing a lifelong example to family and friends. From his early years he was athletic and strong, a member of his high school and college gymnastics teams. That strength followed him through his education and into his first career as a



pilot with the United States Air Force. He flew the T-38 and was a flight instructor for the T-37 before settling into an exciting role flying the largest aircraft the USAF offered during his time – The C5 Galaxy. As a pilot, he was known for his instinctual style and the occasional surprise aerobatic maneuver or fly-by. “He was really one with the plane,” Elaine said. She should know. He taught her to fly in Arlington in the 1990s; that’s how they met. He took a short break from flying to serve in Air Force Intelligence but gladly returned to the C5 where he flew Special Operations and taught aerial refueling. It wouldn’t be unusual to hear him singing “Nice and Easy Does It” by Frank Sinatra to keep the aircraft steady for the boom operator. He flew missions around the world, many of which he wasn’t permitted to share about until long after their completion, if at all. He had an adventurous spirit, always willing to go where he was needed or travel somewhere new or dangerous. After 22 years in the Air Force, Howie continued to fly, becoming a private flight instructor for small aircraft. He also went on to fly routes for Chicago Express, Vanguard (where he became a check airman) and Frontier Airlines before settling down as a flight simulator instructor for Southwest Airlines in Dallas. It was his joy to share the instruction duties with

his wife, Elaine who is a Ground Instructor for Pilot Security and Emergency Procedures. During all these years, Howie raised a family. His two sons fondly recall their early years when Dad would spend hours in his garage workshop tuning up motorcycles, building intricate wooden toys and constructing sturdy furniture. He had a sharp mind for math, was a master of many tools and enjoyed teaching his sons to have the confidence and patience to fix just about anything. If he wasn’t jetting through the skies or tinkering in the garage, his nose was most likely buried in a book. He pored through literature of all kinds, and especially enjoyed learning and studying. Howie was always learning and trying something new, and was known for preparing surprising and delicious recipes for Elaine, family and friends. He recently started pursuing wood carving, creating artful and realistic likenesses of animals and nature. He was also a talented voice actor, lending his unique tone as a volunteer, recording audio books for the blind and occasionally taking on professional voice assignments. You will hear his unmistakable voice in “A Soldier Surrenders, the Conversion of Saint Camillus de Lellis” by Susan Peek. Howie instilled in his family an appreciation for all kinds of music, but especially classical music. He was a Stradivarius supporter of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra. He was a kind and confident man of infinite talents. When the microphone was off, he was known as a man of few words, reminding us all that we learn more by listening than speaking. Elaine said of his service to our council: “He loved being a Knight. He was like a kid going off to camp when he helped with a Knights activity.” His stoicism was his trademark. He is remembered for his quick dry wit, his awful “dad jokes”, his enduring kindness to others and his belief that we each have a responsibility and unique capability to serve and help people. He had an unwavering faith in God and a true passion for service. In addition to Elaine, Howard is survived by sons Chris and Andrew and five grandchildren. Chris and wife Andee have 14-year-old twin daughters Chole and Camee, living in Fort Worth. Andrew and wife Emily have three children – 12-year-old Stephen and 5-year-old twins

Fr. Eugene Okoli – Priest for 25 Years



We're familiar with the Old Testament story of Samuel and Eli, how Samuel didn't initially recognize that he was being called by God multiple times until he was informed of that by Eli.

So [Eli] said to Samuel: "Go to sleep, and if you are called, reply, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.'"

And that is essentially how our Fr. Eugene Okoli frames his first steps toward priesthood, which reached 25 years this past August and was celebrated at Holy Spirit with a special Mass on Saturday, Oct. 6 followed by a reception in the community center that included multiple presentations by Council 8157.

"Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening," Fr. Eugene said, repeating the Biblical verse of 1 Samuel 3:9. "It wasn't anything dramatic. It was a gradual nurturing of faith, even though at the time I couldn't put words to describe it. At my age and experience now, I know what was happening.

"Your servant is listening. That's kind of the way that I can describe my vocation. That's how I want to live my life."

The story of Fr. Eugene's journey to priesthood and to Holy Spirit, where he arrived in July 2015, is compelling and inspirational for its scope in multiple ways. One obvious one is geographical given that he grew up in Nigeria and was ordained there, in his hometown of Ufuma. What isn't as obvious is that he wasn't initially Catholic. His mother, Janet, grew up Catholic while his father, Reuben, was of African traditional religion. The latter was practiced in their home, of which Eugene was the fifth of eight children. An uncle named Lazarus was Protestant and had the Okoli children baptized.

It was soon after Eugene went as a pre-teen to live with a Catholic uncle, Dennis Achugbu, that he began pursuing that faith and even attended catechism classes.

Eugene was ordained on Aug. 21, 1993 and remained in Nigeria until 2000, when his bishop encouraged him to continue his Catholic education. Next stop, the United States, specifically Ohio and Franciscan University in the town of Steubenville. That was where he joined the Knights of Columbus.

"I saw what they were doing. It really got my attention what these guys could do selflessly," he said.

Following graduation, Fr. Eugene left for Michigan and St. Peter and Paul Church in Grand Rapids, where Fr. Dennis Morrow became another important influence in his faith journey. One of Fr. Eugene's KC activities there was chopping firewood. "I loved to do it!"

He arrived in Texas and the Dallas area in 2011 at St. Jude in Allen, where he spent three years, and then was at Divine Mercy in Mesquite for one year before coming to Duncanville.

It was during that first Sunday Mass in the summer of 2015 that we learned Fr. Eugene didn't like the cold in Michigan. And we experienced first-hand his talent for delivery a homily without the use of a written script or notes of any kind, coming down and walking among the pews.

Fr. Eugene doesn't recall exactly when he began that routine while in Michigan. He can identify his Uncle Dennis back home as the most likely influence in his oratory style.

"He was a teacher; he taught me," Fr. Eugene said. "He was gifted. He used so many ways to communicate his lesson to the class."

Fr. Eugene said he doesn't write his homilies ahead of time. He tried that, though.

"I don't feel it [that way]," he said. "At some time, I said, 'Just throw this away and go with the flow. Go with the spirit.' It's just second nature to me. I prepare. I read. I research. I reflect. I pray about it."

"Now, I can recreate what I said. But not before."

Of his time at Holy Spirit, Fr. Eugene said, "I see a deep sense of spirituality. It's also a very welcoming community. And very selfless in terms of sharing with people their talents.

Ira Stroughter

Ira Anthony Stroughter, who first joined the Knights of Columbus when he turned 18 years old, died on July 31 at the age of 71. Ira was a Dallas native, first attending St. Anthony Catholic Church near Fair Park, and moved to DeSoto and was a Holy Spirit parishioner beginning in 1999. He graduated from Jesuit College Prep in 1965, an African-American whose race wouldn't be allowed to attend Dallas' public schools until 1971. Ira then earned a degree in math and economics from the University of Dallas, in Irving, next door to Holy Trinity Seminary. Ira and wife Sheila Brown were married in 1989, and he was

responsible for Sheila going through the parish's RCIA program. Ira owned several businesses throughout his career, including a catering service called "The Cajun Gourmet," and operated a booth at the State Fair of Texas for years. Ira took his major degrees in 1967, left the order some years later, and reentered here at Holy Spirit in 2000. Ira began as a lector at Mass at St. Anthony and was a long-time reader at Holy Spirit, most recently for the 11:30 a.m. Sunday Mass that was moved to 11 this spring. When serving as a reader, Ira reflected his respect for the privilege by dressing in a nice suit. He was also one of the "regulars" scheduled by Carol Lemmon to deliver one of the eight readings during the Easter Vigil Mass on the Saturday night before Easter. Ira specifically did the sixth reading, from the book of Baruch (chapter 3, verses 9-15 and 32-44). During Ira's funeral Mass at Holy Spirit on Aug. 16, the first of the two readings — done by Karen Zachary, a fellow parish lector — consisted of those verses from Baruch. During the service, Fr. Joe Lee noted that Ira often "volunteered" to serve as a greeter in the narthex in addition to whichever parishioner was assigned to the welcome table for that Mass. Ira Stroughter will be missed by many at Holy Spirit.

Here’s how we did it. David Dybala had surveyed the damaged deck beforehand and determined the necessary materials to complete the job (we used every piece) and Allen Reitmeier bought the materials and brought

Battery powered drills were “humming” in a number of places at the same time, while the cut-off saw was in constant use. We finished the project in about 3 hours – actually at total of 18 man/hrs. Everyone stayed hydrated with coffee provided by Nel and Cora and water and Gatorade provided by Allen. Not a harsh word was heard as these 6 Knights of Columbus fulfilled one of our mission; to help those in needs in our parish community. Just as a side note, this was the 279th project completed since the advent of Knight Hands in 2010. It is a tribute to the men who give of their time and skills to help wherever and whenever Knight Hands are called upon. You guys are to be congratulated. Nel and Cora were most appreciative of the effort you guys expended while completing this project. The improved deck looks awesome.

Thank you to John Balasa for relieving Doug at the narthex post and staying to assist with resetting the dining room after the Carter personnel departed.
