Holy Spirit Catholic Church – Duncanville, Tx,



The Knights of Columbus Council #8157's charter was approved and signed by 41 Knights on June 17, 1982. And so it was fitting that a large contingent of Knights arrived at Holy Spirit Catholic Church on June 18, 2022 for Saturday evening Corporate Communion Mass to begin the celebration of this milestone. Led by the 4th degree Color Guard, the Knights and their mates entered the sanctuary as a group; dignified and well turned out. Fr. Tom Cloherty celebrated the Mass with Deacon Al Evans assisting. After Mass everyone migrated to the gymnasium where seats were assigned and social time began. Before dinner was served, adult beverages and soft drinks were available and we were regaled by the amazing sounds of Felipe Ramirez's piano and the voice of Jacqueline Estrada singing inspiring classical music.

Around 7pm, following a prayer from Fr, Steve, dinner was served. Food was catered by Roma's

Italian Bistro and our sisters from Catholic Daughters of America graciously served the food. When the meal was nearly finished we again heard music from Felipe and Jacqueline. What a delightful sound.

At 8:00pm the evenings' program began with Grand Knight Jorge Ruiz acting as emcee. He began by thanking those involved in getting the gymnasium ready for this celebration – those who set up the tables and chairs, made the table center pieces, displayed the pictures of past Grand Knights). He thanked the Catholic Daughters for their help in serving and thanked those who would be cleaning the gymnasium after the celebration was complete. He then got into the heart of the celebration by recognizing all the past priests and deacons who have helped the Knights of Columbus on this 40 year journey. He particularly mentioned those in attendance – Rev. Eugene Okoli, Rev. Tom Cloherty, Rev. Steve Antes, Deacon Gene Freeman, and Deacon Al Evans. His narrative about

all the priests and deacons since 1972 was most interesting and informative. Fr. Eugene was given the floor next and he gave a heartfelt “thank you” to the past and current Knights for all they do to support the clergy and the church.

Dan Murphy then manned the podium as he introduced all the past Grand Knights and a little about each one and their accomplishments. So, of course, he started with Joe Delatte, who along with his wife Mary was in attendance from Rockwall.

Joe was the very first Grand Knight and his joy was “watching the council grow in membership, community service and service to God and the church

As Dan recited the names and accomplishments of each Grand Knight, it was easy to see why this Council has thrived for the past 40 years. Dan named each Grand Knight in succession – **Joe Delatte**, Jim Kowalski, **John Sinks**, Steven Mitchell, **Richard Doucette**, Ernie Coy, **Ron Pinkston**, Russell Gully, **Richard Bates**, Bill Chalko, **Ron Suriano**, Marce Tebbe, **Dan Murphy**, Ed O’Brien, **Chris Kubin**, Andy Goza, **Frank Salazar**, Jim Richardson, **Tom Greco**, Jorge Ruiz.

Along the way Dan pointed out some highlights from the past 40 years. He talked about the Knights instituting the pancake breakfasts noting that the first pancake breakfast was cooked in the Narthex kitchen. In the early 90’s the Men’s Club was disbanded and its’ active members joined the Knights of Columbus. In the mid 90’ the council was awarded the prestigious Star Council award for the first time. He mentioned the Council has received this award many times since then. In the late 90’s the Knights worked at the concession stand in Duncanville raising money for charitable activities. In early 2000, the council became heavily involved in the Fall Festival. In 2008 the council was once again became involved in

baseball concession; this time with Cedar Hill. In late 2010 the Knights began honoring firemen and police officer with a BBQ cook out in Duncanville, Cedar Hill, and DeSoto. In early 2010 Knight Hands was established and has received national attention for their work. And somewhere in there, the Knights started the annual Lenten fish fry. Cooking for the Veterans, the seminarians, and residents of St. Joseph has been a staple activity for many years. Providing financial support for the church and seminarians has also been long running as well as college scholarships for Knight family members

Dan also talked about those who have passed away – Ernie Coy, Bill Chalko (his wife Sandy was in attendance), John Sinks, Ron Suriano, and Andy Goza (his wife Susan was in attendance).

It was inspiring to hear all the “good things” that have happened in the past 40 years that were a direct result of efforts by the Knights of Columbus.

The next part of the evenings’ program, again emceed by Jorge Ruiz, was the roll call of the Knights of the Year for the past 40 Years. As each name was recited, those in attendance stood and at the end received a rousing round of applause. These Knights stood out among their peers for the year they received the award

And the final event was the presentation of the Knight of the year for 2022. The Knight of the year was selected by secret ballot from previous Knights of the Year recipients. This year’s award went to David Dybala



David’s many feats were recited and Larry Balagna, last year’s Knight of the Year presented David an engraved bowl signifying the award.

Knight Hands Support Community



What is in the heart of these dedicated, kind, generous men who are willing to give up a day or two of their lives to help a lady they have never met and one they will probably never see again? On April 28th and 29th of April, 2022, twelve Knights of Columbus did that very thing. In conjunction with the City of Duncanville and P.I.P. (Property Improvement Program), these men met at the home of Barbara Collins and performed -dare I say – a miracle on her home in Duncanville. The first task was repairing a large area of her roof that had been damaged by swaying tree branches. The second task was to repair a large hole in the roof. Larry Balagna, David Dybala, and Jack Ramsden found that place in their heart that said “let’s do this”. This job required ingenuity, resourcefulness, and just plain hard work to



complete. This work was completed on Thursday April 28th in about 24 total man hours.



Both fence gates needed rebuilds. One had no bottom rail at all and dug the ground and the other had a large gap which allowed Mrs. Collins dog to escape from time to time. Jose Montoya and Efrain Ochoa used many of their brain cells to figure out how to make these repairs.

One dead tree (the one causing damage to the fore mentioned roof) was cut down and several other trees were trimmed by the lumberjack of the Council – Mike Fitzgerald who was ably assisted by Ken Rarick and Antonio Razo. Amazing is the only word I can think of to describe their work



There were many rotted sections of fascia and some soffit areas that had to be replaced. Not an easy task by any means. This did not hinder Larry Balagna, David Ybarra, Dan Murphy and Jesse Radillo from

the task. It is always challenging to repair rotted sections of an older home, but that did not deter these men in the least bit.



There were a few other minor repairs as well. The trim around the garage door had to be replaced. There was Jack Ramsden and his ever “can do it” attitude to handle this little project.



In the end we all agreed it was time well spent. But it didn't answer the question of why these men are prompted to give of their time and talent. My guess that answer lies in each man's heart. In the end we spent 96 man hours of work to make Barbara Collins place just a bit nicer. Each of went home on Friday afternoon knowing we are part of an amazing group of men that really care for their fellow man. We have been given the gift and talent to help one another and we should share that gift. The past two day we did.

Knight Hands New Director

On Tuesday morning June 14, 2022 (a very hot day indeed), five brave Knights began the work of tearing down dilapidated fencing and a rotted gate and building a new gate and installing three new sections of fence. First off, Jose Montoya, and Allen Reitmeier and Art Rodriguez removed fencing and posts from a section of fence and installed new 4" X 4" posts to support the new fence. While this was going, David Dybala and Dan Murphy demolished two more sections of fence and removed and discarded the old and rotted gates.



Once the old fencing and gates were removed and trash carried to the street for removal, David and Dan installed new stringers and then new cedar fence slats. Jose and Allen framed out the new gates and Art helped wherever needed.

When all the new slates were installed the gates were install along with hardware and after a bit of clean-up the job was done. In total it took about 24 man hours to complete this project. Cynthia Poole, for whom we did this work, purchased all the raw materials and was most pleased with the final result. Now she can safely get her car in and out of her garage. Congratulations, David and crew on a job well done.



St Joseph's Residence Cook-Out

This was the first time in almost three years that we are able to serve food in person to the residents who were very excited to see us. Knight of the Year 2021-2022



The strong right arm of the church has been holding a ratchet or a power drill this past year at Holy Spirit Catholic Church in Duncanville. David Dybala, a member of Holy Spirit's Knights of Columbus Council 8157 since 1985, was not only one of the most important parishioners in providing guidance and input during the design phase of the renovation of Holy Spirit's sanctuary, narthex and classroom floors this past year but also rolled up his sleeves and contributed to the very labor that completed this spectacular job. That happens when you have an engineering degree from Texas A&M and a work ethic like his established early on.



David organized and supervised the working Knights who removed all furnishing from the church, narthex and the nearby classrooms. That included removing

all the church pews and storing them so the sanctuary floor could be resurfaced. David's innovative dolly system design made the moving of the pews a piece of cake. Equally impressive was the task of replacing all the pews after the floor had been resurfaced. Each pew had to be positioned exactly where it had previously been located so that all the tie-down bolts aligned. In total, David organized and supervised approximately 312 man-hours of labor from brothers who through the years have participated in the council's Knights Hands initiative, which provides volunteer labor to those in need throughout the community.

While David assisted on multiple Knight Hands projects after the church renovation, his next major project was designing and constructing a pedestal for a statue of St. Joseph to be erected in the church's courtyard. After a concrete base was laid down, the pedestal was constructed using the framework designed and built by David. Then, the 800-pound statue was hoisted up onto the pedestal. And lastly, to complete the scenery around the newly installed statue, David supervised the planting of 13 holly bushes around the courtyard. Without his engineering knowhow, this project would have had to be contracted to an outsider. David was present during all these activities, supervising the 202 man-hours of Knight Hands labor.
